African Ancestry: Claims to offer the most accurate DNA mapping of people of African heritage – but it's not cheap so it might be worth checking other sites first. <u>www.africanancestry.com</u>

Ancestry: A subscription-based family tree builder offering access to a wide range of documents. <u>www.ancestry.co.uk</u>

British Association For Local History: A membership organisation promoting local history in the UK. <u>www.balh.org.uk</u>

British History Online: A vast collection of primary and secondary content relating to British and Irish history, <u>www.british-history.ac.uk</u>

British Newspaper Archive: A digital archive containing newspapers published in the UK since 1800. This is a subscription service – although you might be able to find similar information as part of another subscription. <u>www.britishnewspaperarchive.co.uk</u>

Caribbean Family History Group: A project based in Solihull which reaches out across the UK, organising events and pulling together a number of resources. https://caribbeanfamilyhistorygroup.org/

Charles Booth's London: A searchable archive of the notebooks and maps used to create Booth's Inquiry into Life and Labour in London (1886-1903). https://booth.lse.ac.uk

Chartist Ancestors: A great source of information about Chartism, including biographies, memorabilia, resources and a databank of more than 10,000 known Chartists, including where known, their addresses, occupations and contributions to the movement. www.chartistancestors.co.uk/

Commonwealth War Graves Commission: CWGC provide a searchable database of those commonwealth soldiers killed during the world wars. <u>www.cwgc.org</u>

Family Tree Templates: Offers 499 family tree templates you can download and print for free. For a small charge you can also download customizable versions and document bundles starting. www.familytreetemplates.net/

Family Search: A non-profit family, free to access, history site that allows you to search records and build trees etc. Because it is a wiki with contributors from around the world it is good for finding information if you are investigating ancestors originating overseas. www.familysearch.org

Find My Past: A subscription-based family tree builder offering access to a wide range of documents. <u>www.findmypast.co.uk</u>

Free UK Genealogy: Free UK Genealogy provides free, online access to family history records and includes FreeBMD (births marriages & deaths), FreeCEN (census records) and FreeREG (non-civic registrations going back to 1538). <u>www.freeukgenealogy.org.uk/</u>

General Register Office: Part of the Government Passport Office, the GRO maintain the national archive of all births, marriages and deaths dating back to 1837. Certificates can be ordered online. <u>www.gro.gov.uk</u>

Imperial War Museum: Offers a wealth of photos, documents and information regarding the wars our ancestors were involved in. It contains many recorded testimonies from those who experienced events first hand. <u>www.iwm.org.uk/</u>

Naval & Military Archive: A subscription site providing access to British military records. It offers a range of subscriptions from 1 day to 1 year. www.nmarchive.com

The National Archives: The official archive of the UK government with over 1,000 years of documents. Some documents can be digitised and downloaded for a small admin fee. <u>www.nationalarchives.gov.uk</u>
